The recent disaster around the Indian Ocean focused the world's attention on the fragile life of the poor. The outpouring of sup-

Both programs have been on the front lines since the disaster and will be there for the long haul, which is so very important.

I want to thank all of you that have responded through FARMS to aid the survivors of this tragedy. The recipients of these gifts are partner agencies directly involved in the relief and long-term rehabili-

New Program Report: Pangasinan, Philippines

Every new program begins with a lot of prayer. Each situation is unique, but we have found that true local ownership from the start is the

key to success. Once the missionary or indigenous mission leaders select the volunteer committee, this committee is given great autonomy. Yes, they all operate within our guidelines, but each

program has its own written policy that guides the enterprise. I am always pleased with the sincerity and integrity of our loan committees. They serve with a real devotion to see their

fellow Christians come out of poverty through practical stewardship. With out exception, they want the program to succeed! They do not want FARMS to become another "memory", as is the case with so many "development" programs!

FARMS Pangasinan is one of our recent program starts. Committee heads from the southern Philippines and northern Luzon trained this committee. This was one of the first times that our established programs provided training for a new program, and it has worked very well. These trainers had years of experience in ministry, as well as in administering their own FARMS programs.

The first round of loans always provides a tremendous learning experience for each new committee. Much is learned from the successes as well as the occasional failure. We always start the program with a limited amount of capital, usually enough for ten to twenty loans. We do this so that the committee gains experi-

ence that will guide the future of the program. After a year of operation, we evaluate the program before more capital is given. We have always found that the committees take their responsibility seriously because they want their program to succeed.

Let me share some exerts from a recent report by the FARMS Pangasinan committee after there first round of loans.

a flood. We, (Loan Committee), advised them to change their project. We also found that goat raising is not so suitable in our place. This project was diverted to another project.

We don't lose hope. We believe that our Lord will give us wisdom on how to succeed as we prove our faithfulness in serving Him.

Those who are gaining in their projects are faithfully giving their tithes. Three out of the six hog raisers did well and tithed to their churches each cycle from 1,500 to 2,500 pesos. Two out of the three palay-rice businesses tithed from 2,000 to 2,700 pesos. One of the three rice-farming recipients, after three croppings, tithed to his church 1,500 pesos. The two cattle raisers

> are also making good. They are now contemplating to sell their animals and are expecting to have not less than a net gain of 5,000 pesos each.

> It is our prayer request that our projects shall be blessed the more so that one day we are not only the beneficiaries, but also the benefactors to other nations in need.

....We have 17 recipients engaged in different projects such as hog fattening, rice farming, rice and palay (un-milled rice) buying and selling, mini store, cattle and goat raising. As of now some rice projects, goat projects, and the mini store are experiencing fail-

> ures. However, we keep on improving and finding ways to restore their lost capital. It is our prayer that God will make a way. Some have experienced success in their hog fattening, cattle raising, farming, and rice businesses.

Some of those involved in rice farming experienced unforeseen failure due to drought, followed by In Christ's service, Rolando, Justing, Perfecto, Mario and Victoriano

It is a good report, an honest report, one filled with real ownership. I am thrilled with the increased tithing. This will empower the church both spiritually and financially. The ongoing benefits will be tremendous!

We have seen many times that the project holders that face set backs will eventually succeed and in most cases will pay back even the loan of the failed project. I believe this is because <u>they own the program</u> and they realize that another family is waiting for their chance for a loan. True integrity and dignity are the hallmarks of all our programs. This is why FARMS works!
